Socrates' Motto gains force in the New Theory of Education -

Development of Personality the goal.
Old Theory aimed at a product -
the educated man e.g. a gentleman
cultured, polite, an ornament to Society
& Efficient -

It created a certain mould or
form for educated men. e.g. a
Harvard man - an Oxford man -
The system of Edⁿ set its stamp on
men. "Here's our product" -

New Theory: Development of Person-
ality of the Individuality. Its aim
is to make every student realize

the best that is in him, become the strongest, largest, ablest man possible for him - to get full control of himself in the best way. educated men.

It does not aim to make all alike. Every one has his capacities & his limitations. They will be different men, but educated in the sense of having learned to make the most of themselves -

E.g. Difference between building a house & training housebuilders.

This theory sees in every man possibilities for something, be he bright or dull, industrious or lazy, ambitious or indifferent. Problem of teacher to find out

what the boy is good for and to train him to use the powers he has not those which he does not possess.

Difficulties of the College in trying to give individual consideration. Must either take few pupils or train them by classes.

It must establish standards for measuring the students progress & attainments.

Attention.

Leading or ~~driving~~ the mind to.
Concentration is fixing the attention
on one subject or thing.

To keep attention fixed one must
always be discovering something
new.

Memorizing is not attention.
Attention determines the direction

Internationalism

Nationalism = devotion to the interests of the nation -

Internationalism = recognition of the interests of other nations. They are not exclusive. Nationalism may be best advanced by internationalism -

Since the war the new nations which have been created have added more than 11,000 kilometers of customs frontiers -

High walls & tariffs -

Flown over, sailed around, but railways must go through them, with customs & passports vexations & costs -

men are forced to think about
this by economic needs -
Hence talk of U.S. of Europe
Balkan Federation etc
We are being forced to recognize
that nations have common
interests. Extreme nationalism
& separatism leads not only to
hostility & war burdens, but
also to poverty.

It has been estimated that if
the U.S. of Europe could be realized
& customs walls thrown down
this agreement wd raise the
standard of living in Europe
as high as in America.

All nations are dependent on
one another in economic relations

Perhaps the chief value of the League of Nations is that it constitutes a Round Table about which the nations confer regarding common interests.

The great need is that of a moral disarmament-- the creation of a spirit of mutual consideration + of readiness to sacrifice something for the common good.

College is a place to learn this by intercourse between nationalities.

Electives have been conducted in a spirit of nationalism.

Training

What is it? Its Purpose?

Training & Education -

In ordinary use they are different. Training is self-education, it is self-discipline, it is voluntary giving up of some things in order to gain better things. Giving up the harmful, doing the helpful -

Intellectual Training -

Training the mind to do what we want it to do -

Cut out laziness, the lack of determination to force ourselves to study when we do not feel like it - Many drift - not earnest

Cut out too much sport, Play has its place but shd not have too large a place ^{too much outside} activities, drama
Cut out excessive reading of exciting novels that make us indisposed to study ^{depending on the excitement of the story to hold interest}

Learn concentration. Force the mind to fix itself fiercely on the subject. Work hard while we work.

Train the mind to think beyond the lesson - Learn to think things through to the end.

Train the character to serve
the best ends - Spiritual Training.

Cut out selfish & partizan
politics. Train yourself to serve
the group to which you belong,
your class - what are its best
interests, not a section of the
class but the whole class -
serve the college - the whole
body of students. How can you
promote the success of the
College in athletics, in sportsman-
ship, in studies? How can you
sustain & increase the reputa-
tion of the College for turning
out good men, able men,
unselfish men, who will

hit & labor for the good of the
whole people & not only for
one class of the people -


